### **Public Libraries or Public Library Systems in New York State Adult Literacy Services Grant**

Approximately \$200,000 is available for library/adult literacy projects. Activities must be planned and carried out with at least one other community literacy provider such as a public school, college, volunteer group or other not-for-profit organization. Only public libraries and public library systems are eligible to apply for grants not to exceed \$20,000. Adult means anyone 16 years of age or older not attending school full time. Literacy skills means the minimum skills needed to read and comprehend English through the 6th grade level. Libraries will send applications to Library Development and one copy to their public library system. Systems will rank the applications from within their service area in order of greatest need. Ranking will be forwarded to the Division of Library Development. Applications must be received by May 18, 2004.

The New York State Library will send announcements to all eligible libraries and library systems in New York State. To request a copy of
