### **Neighborhood Naturally Occurring Retirement Communities Program**

Applications will be accepted until 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 21, 2005 in response to a Request for Proposals (RFP) for Neighborhood Naturally Occurring Retirement Communities (NNORCS). A NNORC is a geographically defined neighborhood containing not more than 2,000 people who are elderly (i.e., 60 years of age, or older); reside in at least 40% of the units; and which is made up of low-rise buildings six stories or less in height and/or single and multi-family homes; and which area was not originally developed for elderly persons, and which does not restrict admission strictly to the elderly.

\$1.2 million was appropriated in the 2005-06 State Budget. It is anticipated that up to 20 awards will be made, with \$60,000 being the minimum amount and \$150,000 being the maximum amount. Although there is no match requirement for the first year of funding, if funds are received in subsequent years, there will be an escalating match requirement.

The applicant will conduct, or will have conducted a needs assessment on the basis of which the applicant should establish the nature and extent of services to be provided. The provision of services should help elderly residents maintain their independence, improve their quality of life; and avoid unnecessary hospital and nursing home stays as well as providing active and meaningful participation for residents.

## NEW YORK STATE SOIL AND WATER CONSERVATION DISTRICTS

### **Agricultural Nonpoint Source Abatement and Control Grant Program**

Pursuant to Article 11b of the Soil and Water Conservation District Law, applications will be accepted through October 24, 2005 for financial assistance in the form of matching grants to fund nonpoint source abatement and control projects that plan (AEM Tier III) or implement (AEM Tier IV) Agricultural Best Management Practices on New York State farms. All projects must consist of activities that will reduce, abate, control, or prevent nonpoint source pollution originating

from agricultural sources. Applications must be for one of the following: planning activities (AEM Tier III) or implementation (AEM Tier IV).

Eligible applicants are County Soil and Water Conservation Districts or a group of districts acting jointly, who will be referred to as "Project Sponsors." Groups of districts acting jointly should submit one application with one district assuming lead sponsor status. Eligible projects must be for one of the following: planning activities (AEM Tier III) or implementation of agricultural best management practices (AEM Tier IV). Priority consideration will be given to (1) proposals located within a watershed or subwatershed of a priority waterbody as identified by the Commissioner of Environmental Conservation pursuant to Section 17-1407 of the Environmental Conservation Law (2) projects that promote participation in or further priorities of the AEM program (3) projects that clearly address identified need or opportunity (4) projects that are proposed with adequate scope of work and time frame (5) projects that demonstrate strong local and landowner/operator support (6) projects that demonstrate cost effectiveness. If the proposal contains no contribution from the owner or operator of agricultural land, then the State may fund up to 75 percent of the total eligible costs for planning or BMP implementation. The amount of State funding may be increased by a percentage equal to the percentage of the total eligible costs that are contributed by the landowner or operator provided, however, that in no event shall the amount of State funding exceed 90 percent of total eligible costs.

**Centers of Expertise**

Eligible applicants include: Local health departments, non-profit community-based organizations, academic institutions, hospitals and private non-profit training organizations with a minimum of three years of experience delivering training or technical assistance, are eligible to apply. Applicants for Centers of Expertise should have a demonstrated track record, which may include one or more of the following; journal publications, conference presentations, experience developing and delivering direct service model programs in the topic area or a history of developing and delivering training in the topic area.

The purpose of the solicitation is to identify a pool of qualified training contractors with expertise in providing staff development, curriculum development, training and adult education in the field of HIV/AIDS. Through this RFA, the DOH expects to select:

- seven to ten organizations to serve as regional training centers that will deliver training programs on a variety of HIV/AIDS related topics;
- seven to ten organizations to serve as Centers for Expertise in one or the following topic areas:
  - Emerging Issues in Substance Use and Harm Reduction
  - HIV/AIDS in Criminal Justice Setting
  - HIV/AIDS Training of Trainers
  - HIV/AIDS Case Management
  - Behavioral Science
  - Program Evaluation

A total of up to \$1,929,896 in state and federal funds will be available. Downstate regional training center awards will range from \$150,000 - \$250,000. Upstate regional training center awards will range from \$75,000 - \$200,000. The range of awards for Centers of Expertise will vary by topic area, ranging from \$40,000 to \$225,000. Please refer to the RFA for specifics.
