#### **Activities that document life in New York State**

All projects must focus on activities that document life in New York State. 1) Projects to identify, survey and plan for the systematic collection of records relating to underdocumented subjects, institutions or activities, particularly education policy; impact of the World Trade Center attacks; New York's changing industries and new population groups; as well as mental health activities and environmental affairs. 2) Projects to arrange and describe historical records already in repositories or community organizations. 3) Projects to develop strategic plans for historical records repositories or not-for-profit community organizations. 4) Projects for regional documentation planning to identify underdocumented topics or activities.

Application deadline February 1, 2007. A total of \$100,000 is available for grant projects. Grants will be available in amounts from \$1,000 to \$25,000. Projects run July 1, 2007 to June 30, 2008.

The State Archives administers the program. #### **Highway Safety Program**

The Governor's Traffic Safety Committee (GTSC) oversees New York State's highway safety program and receives funding from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration to address highway safety related problems. The goal of the program is to prevent motor vehicle crashes, save lives, and reduce the severity of injuries suffered in crashes on the state's roadways. The GTSC distributes these funds to state agencies, local governments and qualifying not-for-profit agencies through a competitive grant award program. Grants are awarded for one-year periods, with the possible option of up to two

additional one-year periods for renewal, based on the availability of federal funding and the performance of the grantee. To qualify for funding, a highway safety problem must be documented and quantified; and an innovative solution addressing the problem must be proposed. Applications from local governments must be submitted through their local Traffic Safety Board, pursuant to Article 43 of the NY Vehicle and Traffic Law and Article 16-A of the NY Executive Law. Grants for the upcoming 2007 Federal Fiscal Year will run from October 1, 2006 to September 30, 2007. Grant applications must be received by the GTSC on or before May 15, 2006.

#### **COMMUNITY-BASED AND NOT-FOR-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS Minority Health Mini Grant Program 2007 - Achieving Targeted Reductions in Disparities in Asthma, Diabetes, Heart Disease and Stroke**

The New York State Department of Health invites applications from not-for-profit community-based organizations and others to implement small-scale, short-term, well-defined projects designed to achieve targeted reductions in risks associated with asthma, diabetes, or heart disease and stroke in racial and ethnic minority communities.

#### **Eligibility Requirements**

Community-based and not-for-profit organizations that are tax-exempt under Section 501 c (3) of the Internal Revenue Code, and that have a track record of providing services to racial and ethnic minorities in New York State are eligible to apply for funds under this solicitation.

#### **Program Summary**

Through OMH's Mini-Grant Program, the Department seeks to fund interventions that will fill documented gaps in public health services that are designed to achieve measurable outcomes by reducing risks associated with asthma, diabetes or heart disease and stroke among racial and ethnic minorities. To this end, proposed projects must meet the following criteria:

•Demonstrate the potential to improve upon one or more of the following, based on previously successful, evidence-based models or programs:

- individual knowledge and behavior;
- community knowledge and awareness;
- health care provider knowledge and behavior;
- partnership development;
- organizational practice(s); and/or
- influencing policy.

•Expand the use and availability of culturally and linguistically appropriate health education/prevention efforts;

- Outreach to and actively engage members of the racial or ethnic groups or subgroups targeted (community-based);
- Use community assets/strengths based approaches;
- Can be evaluated;
- Can be accomplished within a one year time frame.

It is anticipated that eight (8) projects will be funded at \$10,000 each. Applications will be accepted through 5:00 p.m., November 6, 2006. Awarded projects must be completed by March 31, 2008.
