The New York State Department of State (DOS) is required by Federal regulations to provide timely public notice for the activities described below, which are subject to the consistency provisions of the Federal Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972, as amended.

The applicant has certified that the proposed activity complies with and will be conducted in a manner consistent with the approved New York State Coastal Management Program. The applicant's consistency certification and accompanying public information and data are available for inspection at the New York State Department of State offices located at One Commerce Plaza, 99 Washington Avenue, in Albany, New York.

In F-2012-0323, The New York City Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) is proposing the Water for the Future Program: Delaware Aqueduct Rondout-West Branch Tunnel (RWBT) Repair Project. The project will address the known leaks in the RWBT which range between 16 and 35 million gallons per day. The project would require the construction of an approximately 600-foot-deep shaft (Shaft 6B, on the east connection site) in the Town of Wappinger, and an approximately 900-foot-deep shaft (Shaft 5B, on the west connection site) in the Town of Newburgh. The approximately 2.3-mile long bypass tunnel would be bored between the two shafts parallel and to the north of the existing aqueduct, and would eventually connect to the RWBT. The bypassed portion of the RWBT would be abandoned in place.

The project will require; stream crossings for force mains to convey up to 10 million gallons per day of treated groundwater recovered during tunnel dewatering; potable water main construction; construction of an outfall for the force main; and the tunnel alignment underneath the Hudson River. Additionally, three outfalls to the Class C stream located inland on the west connection site are required to discharge a total of up to 1 million gallons per day of diverted off-site surface runoff, treated groundwater from shaft dewatering activities, treated water from truck wash and concrete batch plant operations, and stormwater runoff from the west connection site.

All stream and wetland crossings would be constructed using jack and bore techniques. The outfalls to the Class C stream on the west connection site would be constructed above the OHW elevation. The bypass tunnel would be constructed approximately 600 feet below the Hudson River using a tunnel boring machine (TBM).

The stated purpose of the proposed project is to "ensure the reliability of potable water supply to 9 million people in New York City and several upstate communities."

Department of State Notice of Negative Declaration

Hudson River Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitats

Counties: Albany; Rensselaer; Columbia; Green; Ulster; Dutchess; Orange; Putnam; Rockland; Westchester- Hudson River- The New York State Department of State, as lead agency, has determined that that the proposed Hudson River Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitat Modifications and Designations will not have a significant adverse environmental impact. The current availability of advanced technologies have allowed for an improved and more detailed understanding of the ecological and natural resource importance and significance of designated habitat areas in the Hudson River Estuary and this has allowed for new scientific information (e.g. species documentation, submerged aquatic vegetation data, bathymetry data) to become available since the original habitat designations in 1987. Moreover, since the original designation of 35 Hudson River Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitats in 1987, the physical conditions of a number of previously designated habitats have changed, given the dynamic natural environment of the Hudson River. Based on those changes and new habitat data and information collected since that time, the Department of State is proposing to modify the written content of the 35 previously designated Significant Coastal Fish and Wildlife Habitats narratives, combining 4 of the originally designated habitats into 2 habitats, modifying 13 of the habitat boundaries, and adding 7 new habitats for a total of 40 proposed habitats. This action is proposed to more fully implement New York State Coastal Policy 7 and other relevant coastal policies in the Coastal Management Program as implemented by Article 42 of the Executive Law and 19 NYCRR Parts 600-603. The project is located on the shores and waters of the Hudson River from the Troy dam south.
